

Anthropology

Dr. Akhil Gupta received his B.S. from WMU in 1977, his S.M. from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in mechanical engineering, and his Ph.D. from Stanford University in engineering-economic systems. He taught at the University of Washington in Seattle for two years and later joined the faculty in the department of anthropology at Stanford University in 1989. Since 1997 he has been associate professor in the department of cultural and social anthropology at Stanford. He has had academic appointments as a visiting professor to universities in Great Britain and France. In addition, he has been a fellow at the National Humanities Center, the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars, and the Agrarian Studies Program at Yale University.

Biological Sciences

Dr. John Mulder earned his B.S. in biology from WMU in 1974. He later received his M.S. in physiology from Wayne State in 1975 and his M.D. in 1980. He worked as a family physician in Muskegon where he became active in the local hospice organization. After additional training and board certification in palliative care, he moved to Nashville, Tenn. where he currently serves as vice president of clinical services and medical director of Alive Hospice. He has been active to further the medical care of people in Third World countries and has worked extensively to facilitate medical care and adoption services for scores of orphaned children in Eastern Europe by coordinating linkages with stateside medical care services and adoption organizations.

Communication

Dr. Carl Botan graduated from WMU with a B.S. degree in 1970. He earned an M.A. in 1982, and a Ph.D. in 1985, from Wayne State University. Botan has traveled extensively in Australia, Europe, and South America lecturing on topics relating to the public relations field. He has also served on the executive committee of the National Public Relations Curriculum Commission of the United States as well as the editorial boards for several communication journals including the *Journal of Public Relations Research* and *Public Relations Review*. Currently Botan is an associate professor of communication at Purdue University where he is a noted scholar in public relations and electronic surveillance in the work place.

Comparative Religion

Dr. Edward T. Linenthal graduated from WMU with a B.A. in comparative religion in 1969. He is currently the Edward M. Penson Professor of Religion and American Culture at the University of Wisconsin, Oshkosh. He is the author of numerous books and articles and has written extensively on a variety of topics including the Holocaust and the Oklahoma City bombing. He is the author

of Preserving Memory: The Struggle to Create America's Holocaust Museum and co-editor of History Wars: The Enola Gay and Other Battles to Preserve America's Past. His latest book, The Unfinished Bombing: Oklahoma City in American Memory, is a powerful

account of the aftermath of the Oklahoma City bombing.

Economics

Dr. Vinod Thomas earned his M.A. in economics at WMU in 1971 and his Ph.D. in economics at the University of Chicago in 1974.

In 1976 he was employed by the World Bank where he has served

in many different capacities including vice president of the World Bank Institute, chief economist for the World Bank in the East Asia and Pacific region, staff director for the 1991 World Development Report, and principal economist for Columbia. Currently, he is the country director of Brazil where he is responsible for one of the World Bank's largest portfolios of lending, policy and analytical work.

Mr. Martin Critchell graduated from WMU in 1973 with a B.A. in English. He received his law degree from Wayne State University School of Law in 1976. the Michigan Supreme Court and Michigan Court of Appeals. Mr. Critchell was admitted not only to the State Bar of Michigan but



Foreign Languages and Literatures

Geosciences

In 1982 Mr. Parker was promoted to vice president and placed in charge of the newly formed division Cascade Geotechnical. In 1987 he joined Associated Earth Sciences, Inc. (AESI), located in Kirkand, Washington. Since that time, the firm has grown to employ a staff of 55 professional geologists, engineers, support staff, and five major divisions. For the past three years, AESI has been named one of the fastest growing privately held companies in Washington.

Mathematics

Dr. Linda Lesniak received her B.A., M.A., and Ph.D. in mathematics from WMU. She went on to serve as a faculty member at Louisiana State University. Currently, she is a professor of mathematics at Drew University in Madison, New Jersey. She has also served as the managing editor of the *Journal of Graph Theory* and is on the editorial boards of both the *Journal of Graph Theory* and the electronic *Journal of Combinatorics*. grants include one from the Office of Naval Research as well as a Fulbright Scholarship to conduct research in Hungary. In addition she is a member of the Center for Discrete Mathematics and Theoretical Computer Science (DIMACS) and director of the DIMACS Connect Institute.

Philosophy

Dr. Bruce Brower received his B.A. in philosophy from WMU in 1976, followed by his M.A. in philosophy in 1980 and his Ph.D. in philosophy in 1985 at the University of Pittsburgh. He has had visiting teaching appointments at the University of Michigan; the University of Wisconsin, Milwaukee; and University of Illinois, Chicago. He has been a member of the department of philosophy at Tulane University since 1989 where he serves as placement director of graduate studies. His main teaching and research interests are in ethics and epistemology. He has published several articles in leading philosophical journals including the *Journal of Philosophy and Ethics* and is currently writing a book entitled *The Community of Reason*.

Dr. Charles Lewis graduated from WMU in 1960 with a B.A. in philosophy. He later attended the Garrett Evangelical Theological Seminary at Northwestern University where he graduated in 1969. In 1976 he became senior pastor of First Congregational Church in Muskegon, Mich. serving a congregation of 1500 members. In 1981 he moved to Naples, Fla. where he founded Community Congregational Church which has grown to a membership of more than 1400. He has served on the board of directors for Y.M.C.A. and United Way of Lee County where he chaired the budget division for seven years. He currently serves on the board of directors of Gulf Coast Center a home for severely challenged adults.

Physics

Dr. Leo Parpart graduated with a B.S. from WMU in 1980. He began his career as the accelerator engineer in the Tandem Van de Graaf Laboratory at WMU. In 1985 he became the accelerator installation engineer for National Electrostatic Corporation where he traveled to more than 30 countries supervising the installation of multi-million dollar accelerator systems. Political Science

Psychology

Sociology

Dr. Ann Goetting received her Ph.D. from WMU in 1978. She is currently a professor of sociology at Western Kentucky University where she teaches courses in gender and family issues. An active researcher, she is the author or co-editor of three books and numerous articles many dealing with domestic violence. This includes a 1999 publication entitled *Getting Out: Life Stories of Women Who Left Abusive Men*. Dr. Goetting has made many presentations at regional and national professional meetings,

and she often serves as an expert witness in cases that involve battered women. She is also the editor of *Network News*, a newsletter for the organization Sociologists for Women in Society.

Statistics

Mr. Loren Huen graduated from WMU in 1966 with a B.S. in mathematics. Following his graduation he began working for the UpJohn Company in the research division. During his employment at UpJohn, he recognized the value of statistics to research analysis and returned to WMU to earn his M.S. in statistics in 1972. After thirty years with UpJohn, he retired in the mid-1990s and formed a company called SiSSA Consulting, Ltd. In 1997, he began teaching part-time in WMU's statistics department where he later joined the full-time staff. In 1999, he ran for a position on the national board of directors for the American Youth Soccer Organization (AYSO) and was elected by the membership. He currently serves as the AYSO's national secretary.
