Approval of Minutes of 3 April Senate Meeting

Senate President William Rantz's report included the following:

 Rantz said he was honored to have served as Senate president and
 thanked the Executive Board members who served with him the last two
 years: Vice President Dennis Simpson, and directors Osama Abudayyeh,
 Suzan Ayers, Richard Gershon, Alan Rea, and Delores Walcott.
- Provost Greene is out of the country this evening.
- Summary results of the 2014 presidential appraisal have been provided to President Dunn and the Board of Trustees. The appraisal was sent to 943 faculty with a 26% response rate.

Remarks by John Dunn, WMU President

President Dunn's remarks included the following:

- He thanked Senators and the Senate leadership for their service. He was pleased the new WSA leadership was in attendance.
- He thanked faculty for their participation in the presidential evaluation, noting it is very instructive and helpful and feedback was very good. He commented he wished that more than 26% of the faculty would have participated and suggested perhaps the instrument was too long.
- The administration continues to keep an eye on Lansing regarding funding.

ACTION ITEM

Liberal Education and America's Promise (LEAP) States Initiative Resolution

David Reinhold, associate provost for assessment and undergraduate studies, presented the following resolution regarding the LEAP States Initiative:

A Resolution to Support Western Michigan University Joining Other Institutions in the State of Michigan to Seek LEAP State Designation from the Association of American Colleges and Universities (AAC&U)

Whereas, associate provosts at all fifteen public universities in the State of Michigan have begun exploring the AAC&U Leap States Initiative;

Whereas, Western Michigan University supports the basic philosophy and merits of a liberal education as articulated by the AAC&U;

Whereas, the value of higher education has come under fire in recent years;

Whereas, higher education institutions in the state have not effectively communicated to the public the benefit of a bachelor's degree;

Whereas, higher education institutions across the state can benefit from discussions across institutional boundaries of common concerns;

Whereas, Michigan institutions of higher education could benefit from the facilitated interaction and opportunities for collaboration with other LEAP states through the AAC&U;

Therefore Be It Resolved, that Western Michigan University formally accepts inclusion into the Michigan LEAP State Initiative and pledges participation in the process to establish Michigan as an AAC&U LEAP State.

Reinhold noted the resolution has been endorsed by the Senate's Undergraduate Studies Council, Committee to Oversee General Education and the Ad Hoc Committee on General Education. <u>A motion was made by Baldner, supported by Jellies, to approve the resolution</u>. <u>Motion carried</u>.

WMU Library of the Future

Joe Reish, dean of University Libraries, provided an update on the University's library system. The current system is 15 years old and predates Google and smartphones. It is overtasked and has minimal vendor support. To provide state-of-the-art technologies, new products are being researched for an integrated library system in the cloud to address print and electronic content.

2014-15 University Common Read

Duane Hampton, from Geosciences and a member of the University Common Read Committee, announced the 2014-15 selection is <u>Life of Pi</u> by Yann Martel. It will be used in the First-Year Experience Program and the committee hopes to get students engaged through upcoming events and opportunities, including a campus visit by the author on 23 October.

Introduction of 2014-16 Faculty Senate President-Elect C. Dennis Simpson

Senate President Rantz introduced C. Dennis Simpson, the 2014-16 Faculty Senate president. Simpson joined the WMU faculty in 1978 and is a professor in

the Physician Assistant Department and Director of the Specialty Program in Alcohol and Drug Abuse. He has served twice as Senate vice president and for seven years on the Executive Board. He also served as president and vice president of the WMU Chapter of the AAUP.
