C.C. Wang: Lines of Abstraction

Exhibition, Kalamazoo Institute of Arts C. C. Wang is best known as a preeminent twentieth-century connoisseur and collector of pre-modern Chinese art, a reputation that often overshadows his own artistic achievements. Held twenty years after the artist's death, *C. C.*

Wang: Lines of Abstraction recenters Wang's extraordinary career on his own artistic practice to reveal an original quest for tradition and innovation in the global twentieth century. Spanning seven decades, the exhibition focuses on the artist's distinctive synthesis of Chinese ink painting and American postwar abstraction.

relations – which may help Modi's BJP as it gears up for elections in 2024.



UnReeled: Unsung Heroes of Ink


ancient methods to hand-produce Xuan paper. These craftspeople, who have spent a lifetime honing their skills, are the "unsung heroes of ink."

Despite recent high-level exchanges between the US and China, including visits to China by US Secretary of State Anthony Blinken and Secretary of the Treasury Janet Yellen, and the US Senator



delegation by Chuck Schumer, the US-China relationship has remained at the lowest point since President Nixon's historical visit to China in 1972, with hawkish tones and disputes over Taiwan and tech-war becoming the new normal. Their talks have become exchanges of accusations rather than finding resolutions. How has the relationship got to this point? Why has communication failed to facilitate mutual accommodation? What are driving tensions and the root causes of this crisis? What is the prospect of the Sino-US competition? How can Washington and Beijing stabilize the relationship? Dr. Zhao's talk will see answers to these important questions.
