The level of involvement OBF has in commencment

December 16, 2023, Commencement is the celebration of graduation. The ceremony recognizes the completion of degree requirements, which, at WMU, is a top priority. Faculty, the President's office, student affairs, students, and parents are people you would expect to see preparing and celebrating, but would you believe OBF employees play a massive role in this event? Weeks before the event, a committee convenes with members from the President's office, Public Safety, Miller Auditorium, Facilities Management, Board of Trustees, the Registrar, and more to discuss coordination, schedule, concerns, and new ideas. This collaboration begins preparation for the event. Custodians, electricians, plumbers, project specialists, maintenance, landscapers, and other facilities (AFSCME) staff check, repair, and clean everything from floorboards to chandeliers and sidewalks to outside lighting. Several walk-throughs of buildings and campus open areas are performed to look for facility concerns. Public Safety schedules security, traffic control, and EMS and ensures Parking Services preparations are done for all parking needs. Miller staff coordinates audio, video, lighting, and stage setup. Recently, hanging the country flags representing all current international students has been added back into the day's ceremonies. AFSCME staff are on-site during the event to handle immediate concerns that may arise. Spaces are cleaned continuously so each graduate has a fresh space for gathering and photos. Miller staff greet guests and attend to immediate needs. All hands are on deck. At WMU, every detail is thought of and given attention. Right down to the spray of the fountains in the plaza.

Custodial Services has top-notch training and learning center

From a repurposed area to a space of pride. This ideal custodial training and learning center in the physical plant saves time and is a safer location to welcome outside vendors to show the latest products of the custodial world. The spacious room houses a large photo organizational chart of the area I think of as the Wall of Fame. They test and train on equipment such as the touch-free Ozone cleaning methods used in the restrooms. This electrified water disinfects without harsh chemicals, although a deep clean with safe chemicals is done once per week. The Kalvac sprays high-pressure water, breaking up dirt and bacteria, then vacuums away the dirty water without wiping it all over the surfaces. The smaller room houses computers used for online training. Employees are also welcome to use this space to check Go WMU, WMU email, and other work-related technology needs. 

WMU Design Center Partnered with KDPS to Benefit Kalamazoo Area Kids

Earlier this year, the Kalamazoo Department of Public Safety (KDPS) contacted the Design Center at the Gwen Frostic School of Art to create a custom coloring book on fire safety. This book will be distributed to K-2nd grade students when KDPS holds presentations in schools across Kalamazoo County. They were using a generic one but wanted a version that was specific to the items and places the kids see around them. Design Center students met with officers and fire marshals to plan the content. The student designers researched images and resources provided by KDPS, designed an illustration style, and organized it interestingly and logically. Frequently used emergency numbers and neighborhood locations were also added. Projects of this nature give students real-world job experience with actual clients during the academic process.
